Coordinate the construction of goat/sheep sheds

Maintain the goat/sheep sheds

AGR/N4509: Carry out breeding of goats/sheep

Description

This OS unit is about breeding goats/sheep, which includes making appropriate preparations, the relevant breeding activities and appropriate care for the female goats (does)/female sheep (ewes) and kids/lambs.

Scope

The scope covers the following :

- Prepare for goat/sheep breeding
- Carry out goat/sheep breeding
- Maintain the does/ewes and kids/lambs

Elements and Performance Criteria

Prepare for goat/sheep breeding

To be competent, the user/individual on the job must be able to:

- **PC1.** select the appropriate goat/sheep breeds for breeding based on the relevant factors, e.g. growth rate, efficiency of weight gain, litter size, etc.
- PC2. select healthy bucks/rams and does/ewes of the recommended age for breeding
- **PC3.** carry out flushing before the breeding season to prepare the does/ewes for breeding
- PC4. follow the recommended practices to prevent over-fattening in does/ewes
- **PC5.** plan mating of goats/sheep during the recommended weather to ensure the birth of kids/lambs at an appropriate time for their survival

Carry out goat/sheep breeding

To be competent, the user/individual on the job must be able to:

- **PC6.** feed the pregnant does/ewes with the recommended diet, containing the appropriate nutrients to ensure improved milk production and healthy birth weight for kids/lambs
- **PC7.** ensure appropriate care for does/ewes during the advanced stages of their pregnancy, e.g. comfortable bedding and protection from adverse weather
- PC8. arrange the required tools, equipment and materials for breeding
- PC9. prepare the tools and equipment, carrying their regular maintenance

5. In case of successfully passing only certain number of NOSs, the trainee is eligible to take subsequent assessment on the balance NOS's to pass the Qualification Pack.

6. In case of unsuccessful completion, the trainee may seek reassessment on the Qualification Pack

Glossary

Sector	Sector is a conglomeration of different business operations having similar business and interests. It may also be defined as a distinct subset of the economy whose components share similar characteristics and interests.
Sub-sector	Sub-sector is derived from a further breakdown based on the characteristics and interests of its components.
Occupation	Occupation is a set of job roles, which perform similar/ related set of functions in an industry.
Job role	Job role defines a unique set of functions that together form a unique employment opportunity in an organisation.
Occupational Standards (OS)	OS specify the standards of performance an individual must achieve when carrying out a function in the workplace, together with the Knowledge and Understanding (KU) they need to meet that standard consistently. Occupational Standards are applicable both in the Indian and global contexts.
Performance Criteria (PC)	Performance Criteria (PC) are statements that together specify the standard of performance required when carrying out a task.
National Occupational Standards (NOS)	NOS are occupational standards which apply uniquely in the Indian context.
Qualifications Pack (QP)	QP comprises the set of OS, together with the educational, training and other criteria required to perform a job role. A QP is assigned a unique qualifications pack code.
Unit Code	Unit code is a unique identifier for an Occupational Standard, which is denoted by an 'N'
Unit Title	Unit title gives a clear overall statement about what the incumbent should be able to do.
Description	Description gives a short summary of the unit content. This would be helpful to anyone searching on a database to verify that this is the appropriate OS they are looking for.
Scope	Scope is a set of statements specifying the range of variables that an individual may have to deal with in carrying out the function which have a critical impact on quality of performance required.









Knowledge and Understanding (KU)	Knowledge and Understanding (KU) are statements which together specify the technical, generic, professional and organisational specific knowledge that an individual needs in order to perform to the required standard.
Organisational Context	Organisational context includes the way the organisation is structured and how it operates, including the extent of operative knowledge managers have of their relevant areas of responsibility.
Technical Knowledge	Technical knowledge is the specific knowledge needed to accomplish specific designated responsibilities.
Core Skills/ Generic Skills (GS)	Core skills or Generic Skills (GS) are a group of skills that are the key to learning and working in today's world. These skills are typically needed in any work environment in today's world. These skills are typically needed in any work environment. In the context of the OS, these include communication related skills that are applicable to most job roles.
Electives	Electives are NOS/set of NOS that are identified by the sector as contributive to specialization in a job role. There may be multiple electives within a QP for each specialized job role. Trainees must select at least one elective for the successful completion of a QP with Electives.
Options	Options are NOS/set of NOS that are identified by the sector as additional skills. There may be multiple options within a QP. It is not mandatory to select any of the options to complete a QP with Options.
